Achieving substantial fundraising towards capital development and building improvements, as well as ambitious engagement projects	In this period The Trust has secured two small grants – £5000 from the Radcliffe Trust towards traineeships and volunteer development in Paradise Mill; and £5000 from the Arts Scholars Trust to work with children and young people to interpret the historic childrenswear collection. This will allow us to explore new and innovative ways to include the thoughts of children and young people in the interpretation. This will result in an exhibition of the collection on site and online, with childrenswear displayed across the Museum and Mill.
	The Director is developing a number of substantial grant applications:- To the Arts Council's MEND scheme for funding towards roof repairs at the Silk Museum – a Costed Conservation Survey has been commissioned towards this. Eol to be submitted by mid April – grant request likely to be c.£100k depending on Conservation Survey To the Arts Council's Unlocking Collections for £30k towards new interpretation and community engagement with Paradise Mill to strengthen the offer and relevance to local people. Application to be submitted by the end of March To the Headley Trust – to strengthen the Museum staff capacity for managing our heritage buildings. This will involve arranging visit to Macclesfield by the Headley Trust's Lead Executive in order to raise profile of the town's heritage with this funder
Making our buildings accessible to all	The reinstatement of the passenger lift now makes Paradise Mill accessible to all visitors, particularly those with mobility issues or visual impairment. We are now encouraging visits from disabled groups for whom the Mill has been inaccessible in recent years. Look Around Tours were held during half-term, to mark the reopening of Paradise Mill, by opening up the Mill to local people after the long closure. They took place on 17th, 21st – 25th February. The History Hunters and members of the Museum staff supported the Mill Guides in carrying out the Tours. Look Around Tours were an experiment to test new ways to engage new audiences for and raise the profile of the Mill.

We are continuing to develop relationships with East Cheshire Eye Society to programme events for their 150th anniversary in 2015 ProjectInc – several of their neuro-diverse young members are completing work experience with us and have been involved with co-curation of exhibitions. JustDropIn – this charity support young people with their mental health. We co-run an annual writing camp and host their 'Have your say' consultation day.
