




1. Visitor Data

- Summer holiday family activities have been well attended. Weekly free activities supported by Cheshire East Levelling Up fund. ~50 participants a week – 50:50 return visitors and new visitors.
- Cardboard Clues has continued to bring in new visitors and high numbers. Participants have tended to stay for a long time, been intergenerational groups and spend (low level) in shop and café.
 Plans are being discussed for a Christmas special and another set of stories next year.

2.1 Silk Museum Collections update

- Awarded "Quality Assessed" rating in an assessment by Visit England. Our score increased 1% from last visit, giving us an overall score of 85% and a nomination for their "Welcome Accolade".
- New interpretation produced to improve the visitor flow of the museum.
- New exhibition of 10 specially conserved artworks from the West Park Museum collection launched in the Town Hall. The artworks are viewable by the public for the first time since before the COVID-19 pandemic, over 5 years ago.
- Visited by 3 researchers:
 - PhD researcher (Marianne Brocklehurst's Egyptian Diary and Sketch Books)
 - PhD researcher applying AI to the Godwin Pattern Book collection
 - Patchwork researcher who is writing an article on our collection for the Patchwork Society's magazine.

Heritage Open Day 2025 will be a celebration of all the hard work that has been breathing life back into Paradise Mill over the past 12 months, with

More Working Looms

- The number of working looms has increased from 1 to 4 in the past 12 months. We now have one 6 shaft dobby loom, two 400 hook Jacquards and now one 600 hook Jacquard. The 600 hook is functional but would benefit from a new warp in the new future.
- After 5 ½ years of dedicated work, both the Leslie Winnell and David Jones looms are fully restored. Started in 2019, the project was initially funded by the Association for Industrial Archaeology and its final stages have been funded by the Radcliffe Trust and Rogers & Goffigon.
- This July, for the **first time in 30 years**, former weaver in residence 1987-1990, **Kathleen Butler**, who now works for Rogers & Goffigon, visited Paradise Mill to see the restoration work in action.
- More functional looms means that we can host more weavers and produce more designs, adding a much needed element of dynamism and contemporary design to the historic environment.












More Weavers Designing

- New Weaver in Residence, Eleanor Godfrey, has produced 5
 new ancient Egypt inspired designs on the newly restored 6shaft dobby loom, which hasn't worked for around 20 years.
 Eleanor ran two fully booked workshops with Space4Autism
 and East Cheshire Eye Society.
- An exhibition of Eleanor's work will be launched on Heritage
 Open Day, the first special exhibition in the mill for at least a
 decade.
- Two new graduate weavers, Cecile Driver and Halle Sivyour, have been recruited for placements in the mill. They will restore looms, produce a new design and enrich tours. They will start in October.
- Our workforce has expanded, with three new volunteers joining the mill team. They bring varied skills from restoration to weaving, storytelling to problem-solving.









More Varied Interpretation


- The first new interpretation in the mill in 40 years will be soft launched on 13th September and formally launched in November.
- The interpretation has been designed with underserved community groups, such as Just Drop In, East Cheshire Eye Society and Ash Grove School, to ensure that it is inclusive and accessible.
- The History Hunters volunteer group researched former employees discovering never before heard stories and interviewing former workers and their relatives to reveal a new more personal history of Paradise Mill.
- Visitors can **explore the mill at their own pace** and in their own order using **QR codes** and newly installed **Wi-Fi** and TV to access **brand-new digital interpretation**.

2. Update for Future Collections Projects & Exhibitions

- A new opportunity for communities to exhibit their work in our new Community Case due to be installed September - Just Drop In to be the first exhibitors.
- Launching new Oral History drop-ins in October to record visitors' memories of the silk industry. Run by the History Hunters volunteers every Thursday 1pm – 3pm.
- Taking the first steps to create new digital interpretation for the Silk Museum by joining the app Bloomberg Connects. Starting work in Jan/ Feb 2026.
- Broadening the relevance of our collections through partnership with Body Positive -project starting around Macc Pride 2026 with creative activities, oral histories, a community mapping (a Cheshire wide project) - Culminating in a History of Drag exhibition in 2027 in the gallery space. (Easter time start).
- Alongside Historic Royal Palaces, Worthing Museum and Whitchurch Silk Mill, the Silk Museum is hosting Stephanie Smart's paper fashion exhibition in **April 2029** in both gallery space and one piece in Paradise Mill.

3. Volunteer update

Supported by Kids in Museums we are in the process of **recruiting young trustees** (18-30 year olds) to our Board of Trustees.

















Facebook views up over this period.

Views highest when shared on local groups, especially Macclesfield Memories










Q3 Headline Community Activities


